Risk tools and scales have a positive predictive value of less than 5%, meaning that they are wrong 95% of the time, and miss suicide deaths in the large 'low risk' group. In a sample of patient suicides, the quality of assessment of risks and management was considered by clinicians to be unsatisfactory in 36% .
